When I think about that young woman who walked away from security, I wish I could sit beside her for a few minutes.

Try This Today

Ask yourself:

What part of my life am I holding onto simply because it feels familiar, even though my heart has already moved on?

Write down:

- what values feel threatened where you are,
- what mission still matters to you,
- and what one next step would honor both.

Do not force the whole future into focus.

Just identify the next honest move.

A Letter Before You Leave

Dear Friend,

If you are standing at the edge of a beginning you did not ask for—or one you know you need to choose—I want you to hear this clearly:

being afraid does not mean you are failing.

It may simply mean the step is real.

You are allowed to grieve what you are leaving.

You are allowed to miss the security.

You are allowed to wish the map were clearer.

And you are still allowed to move.

Sometimes the bravest thing a person does is leave a place that no longer fits their values before the next place is fully visible.

So be gentle with yourself if the road feels uncertain.

Knock on the next door.

Take the next honest step.

Trust that purpose can survive transition.

And remember: starting over is not always the end of something stable.

Sometimes it is the beginning of something true.
